One proven student success tactic is coming to Maine’s Community Colleges. High school partners may be interested in learning how this change will impact students. A “math pathway” approach to a college degree means that the required courses will align with the industry needs of each program and that all students will be able to complete their gateway course in the first year of college. Students need to feel that the math they take is relevant, meaningful, and necessary for their future career – and this approach achieves that.
